### Vandalizing cave gates

(Waldo Brothers Grotto)

During the last several years, there have been multiple reports of NSS members violating cave gates. At least one of these incidents is well documented. The failure of the NSS to take any punitive action has and will continue to cause great harm to the image of the NSS and its members.

It is hereby moved that NSS members who violate or bypass any cave gate for any reason other than in an emergency situation or with the owner's/administrator's permission shall be removed from the NSS membership roll and will be permanently barred from NSS membership.

### II. Public education

(Greater Cincinnati Grotto)

In keeping with its new high-profile policies, the NSS can expect more public inquiries into caves and caving. The local and regional Internal Organizations (I/O's) will most probably be called on to satisfy these inquiries in their areas. To assist the I/O's and to avoid misinformation being disseminated, the NSS should develop and circulate a consistent, basic set of information for presenting such programs. This information should be presented as guidelines, not as restrictions.

To maintain a consistent Cave Education policy nationally, the BOG should form an Ad Hoc Committee to publish guidelines for public classes by I/O's. The guidelines would include philosophy, curricula, and conservation topics to aid I/O's in developing appropriate cave education classes, lectures, or public information series. The guidelines would be complete enough for a brief talk or for a whole series of classes. They would be informative, not compulsory, guidelins.

(San Francisco Bay Chapter)

#### IV. Convention impact on caves

(Sandia Grotto)

Many cavers attend NSS conventions to view and experience caves and caving under different conditions and locality. Because of the traffic impact by large numbers of cavers in such a short period of time (2-3 weeks), trips to caves should be held at a minimum and with a view towards conserving the area's cave resources rather than abusing them. Example: The bid for a convention in New Mexico was voted against largely because access to caves is tightly controlled and limited. We felt the votes of sany BOG members did not consider conservation of the cave resource as heavily as sport caving during the convention by large numbers of cavers at one time.

We recommend that more consideration be given to lessening impact on area caves when planning and selecting NSS convention sites through limited, guided trips to the area caves.

#### V. Geographical Representation on BOG

(Western and Rocky Mountain Regions)

Approximately 20% of the membership of the NSS reside from the Rocky Mountains to the West Coast. Yet another 12% of the membership live between the Rocky Mountains and the Mississippi River. While the concerns and issues facing the cavers in these geographic sections vary from those facing cavers in the East, the geographic distribution of BOG directors seldom reflects the geographic distribution of major segments of the NSS membership.

Whereas: The geographical regions of the United States vary significantly in numbers and types of caves, in caver population, in distances between caving areas, and in land ownership patterns; and

Whereas: These regional differences can lead to differences in access to caves, in land owner relations, and in caver attitudes and positions on national issues; and

Whereas: It is in the best interest of the National Speleological Society and of the growth of NSS membership that all geographical regions be represented on the Board of Governors; and

Whereas: The present system of electing BOG members does not ensure representation from all geographical regions of the country:

Therefore be it resolved: That the present system of electing BOG members be changed so that the same number of BOG members are elected as at present but that a member of the BOG be elected by the NSS members resident in each of the four geographical regions of the United States, with all remaining BOG members being elected at large by all NSS members, and that the four geographical regions be divided by lines drawn along the Rocky Mountains, the Mississippi River and the Appalachian Mountains, but not so as to divide current NSS regions.
